#### History and Organization

#### MISSION STATEMENT

It is the mission of the Capitol Zoning District Commission, using the Capitol Zoning District Ordinance (Master Plan), to administer special zoning regulations and design guidelines in the district that preserve the dignity of the Capitol Building and Governor's Mansion, that coordinate physical development within the Capitol Area and Mansion Area of the District in accordance with present and future needs of each area, that insure efficient expenditure of public funds and that promote the safety, convenience and general well-being of the inhabitants and property owners within the District.

#### RESPONSIBILITY

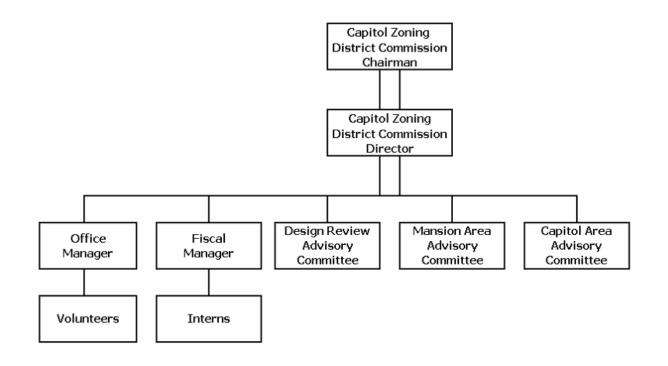
The Commission is charged with regulating zoning, development, and design within the Capitol Zoning District pursuant to a Master Plan formulated and maintained by the Commission to effectuate its applications for permits on matters within the Commission's jurisdiction, including signage, landscaping, building height and bulk, land use, parking and architectural significance.

#### ACTIVITIES AND ADVISORY COMMITTEES

The Commission meets once a month to review and act on applications for variances, conditional use permits, demolition permits, the design of new construction, and major modifications to architecturally significant structures. In reviewing these applications, the Commission is assisted by two citizen advisory committees, one for each area regulated by the Commission, and a professional design review committee. These advisory committees review applications pertinent to their areas of interest and expertise and forward their recommendations to the Commission.

#### IMPACT AND FUTURE PLANS

City maps particularly reflect the positive impact of the Capitol Zoning District in the Mansion & Capitol Area. New development is on the increase in both the Mansion and Capitol Areas with construction of new residential and commercial infill on previously vacant lots and continuing restoration and rehabilitation of the wonderful historic structures. Numerous new residents are moving into the areas attracted by the stock of beautiful historic properties, dramatically increasing property values for the area. These neighborhoods have again become a source of pride for the residents and visitors to the area, and a source of interest for developers of historic properties.



### Agency Commentary

The Capitol Zoning District Commission is responsible for preserving the dignity of the State Capitol and the Governor's Mansion by regulating zoning development and design within the Capitol Zoning District.

The nine (9) member Commission meets monthly to review and act on applications for various permits for land use and development. Two (2) citizen advisory committees and a professional design review committee assist the Commission by making recommendations to the Commission.

Maintenance and Operations: An increase of \$7,673 in FY2008, and \$4,373 in FY2009 is needed for the following reasons:

- 1) To adequately fund rising costs of routine office operations.
- To update our 10-year old failing computer system by installing new computers and software for three (3) computer stations. This will enable us to conform to effective interaction with other state agencies.
- 3) The \$600 increase in Conference and Travel Expense will allow computer and software training on the new computer systems.
- 4) For the last several years we have been using reserved postage on our postage machine. This postage will be depleted in FY2007. Our legislation requires us to mail public meeting notices to our Commissioners, committees, the press, and for general public requests.

#### Analysis of Budget Request

Appropriation:	676 - Capitol Zoning District-State Operations
Funding Sources:	HUA-Miscellaneous Agencies Fund

The Capitol Zoning District Commission was created by Act 267 of 1975 (A.C.A.§ 22-3-303). Duties of the Commission include development of a comprehensive zoning plan in the Capitol Zoning District, which encompasses the areas surrounding the State Capitol and the Governor's Mansion. The Act further provides that the Commission has exclusive authority over the zoning and regulation of all property within the District. Act 262 of 1997 transferred the funding and authority to hire the director and staff from State Building Services, now Arkansas Building Authority, to the Commission.

This is the primary operating appropriation of the Commission. It is funded entirely by general revenue.

A cost of living increase is not incorporated in Base Level pending the outcome of the Classification and Compensation Study. FY07 salary levels have been held flat each year for all incumbents. Personal Services Matching may reflect increases in the Base Level due to the Social Security Tax maximum income limit and certain increases in Worker's Compensation and Unemployment Tax rates. Personal Services Matching also includes a \$30 increase in the monthly contribution for State employee's health insurance for a total State match per budgeted employee of \$350 per month.

The Base Level Request is \$212,078 in FY08 and in FY09.

The Change Level Requests submitted are \$ 7,673 in FY08 and \$ 4,373 in FY09 and are summarized as follows:

- Operating Expenses of \$7,073 in FY08 and \$3,773 in FY09 for increases in postage, copier lease, Department of Information Services (DIS) providing all Information Technology needs for the Agency, including hardware, software, printer, network, and internet installations; and DIS's master service agreement increase to provide phone, fax, modem and internet connection services.
- 2. Conference & Travel Expense of \$600 each year respectively to attend computer training seminars offered by (DIS).

The Executive Recommendation provides for Base Level and total Change Level requests of \$4,000 in FY08 and \$2,000 in FY09 in funding and appropriation. The recommended Change Levels provide additional Operating Expenses for the Agency with no Conference and Travel Expense increase.
