

AGENCY PROGRAM COMMENTARY 1997-1999

The Arkansas Division of Volunteerism (ADOV), the oldest statewide office of volunteerism in the country, promotes and supports volunteerism and community service as a means of local, state and national problem-solving by providing program development, training, technical assistance and information. Part of the division's mission is to recognize volunteer efforts around the state.

These are some of the programs and services that ADOV offers to communities and the people of Arkansas.

A. The Volunteer Consultant Service Program (VCSP) was established in 1981 to provide local governments with professional volunteers who have skills and expertise in planning and developing community projects and meeting relevant city and county needs. Independently, and through professional associations, the VCSP has recruited volunteers across the state in the areas of planning and management, fiscal management, budgeting,law, land development, architecture, engineering, recordkeeping, emergency services planning, and public administration. These services, though needed by local officials, are often not available because of budget limitations. By use of the VCSP, local officials can often continue primary services when federal funds to city and county governments are curtailed and local funds cannot be stretched to meet the needs. These volunteer consultants are definitely making an impact and filling in the gaps. Forty-four projects were completed in the last two years. During FY'96, 32 projects were started with 1,200 hours of volunteer service valued at \$115,000. The VCSP will be expanding in the next two years to include providing the same volunteer consultant services to schools and nonprofit organizations.

B. The Arkansas Mentors Program, developed in partnership with the Division of County Operations, provides skilled and experienced volunteer mentors who act as role models, teachers, sponsors, encouragers, counselors and friends to AFDC Project Success customers who are trying to become self-sufficient. These volunteer mentors empower the less skilled and experienced mentees to become economically independent. Working exceptionally well in Chicot, Phillips and Polk counties, the program is in the expansion process as a means of addressing welfare reform. In Chicot county, of the 13 mentees, five just graduated from high school and all are pursuing further education. None have had a second pregnancy. In Phillips County, there are 26 mentee/mentor matches and all are in school or doing volunteer work to gain work experience while they are searching for job. In Polk County, the mentees are beginning a series of "Survival Skills for Women" classes.

C. Volunteer Program Development is a primary function of ADOV. The Department of Human Services' (DHS) Volunteer Clearinghouse, established in 1988, is coordinated from the Division of Volunteerism. It's focus is to recruit, screen, train, and refer citizen participants for meaningful volunteer service within DHS. During FY'96 approximately 63 volunteers provided services to DHS and contributed 5,060.5 hours of service with a dollar value of \$73,782. The Clearinghouse continues to maintain, monitor and evaluate several components of ongoing projects involving undergraduate students attending area colleges (Internships), Summer Youth Employment Training Program, Summer Service Exploration Project, community service opportunities for students enrolled in New Futures for Little Rock Youth Program, and to work with the courts to develop community service opportunities for adjudicated youth. ADOV has helped organize **20 Volunteer Centers** across the state. These centers act as referral and screening agents for volunteer needs in their communities. Other programs which ADOV has founded and continues to support are the Certified Volunteer Managers certificate program, the "Spirit of 110", the DHS Volunteer Activities Council, and the Arkansas Volunteer Coordinators Association.

D. Training and Technical Assistance are regularly provided by ADOV to statewide agencies and nonprofit organizations in volunteer principles and management techniques. ADOV assists the Division of Youth Services in training volunteer mentors and provides technical assistance to Little Rock Fighting Back and Pulaski County Family and Youth Council. ADOV supports the Division of Children and Family Services by developing foster parent training, and the Division of Disabilities Services by providing statewide training and technical assistance to volunteers with disabilities and agencies using their services. In FY'95 more than 890 participants from government, nonprofit and corporate sectors attended ADOV volunteer Management Training. Eleven state institutions have persons coordinating volunteers who receive ADOV training and technical assistance. In the first half of FY'96, these nstitutions were served by 2,988 volunteers who gave over 47,970 hours. Another collaborative effort is ADOV's work with the United Community Organizations of Arkansas (formerly called UCRCs) in 60 counties. ADOV provides the technical assistance necessary to enable the UCOAs to manage their volunteer programs which direct food, clothing, hospice care, shelter and emergency funds to Arkansans in need. ADOV also provides technical assistance to the group in putting on annual and regional conferences.

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ADOV disseminates information on volunteerism on a world wide basis through its Resource Center. The Center houses the largest collection of volunteer information in the nation and iunctions as a lending library that provides information and research on all aspects of the volunteer field.

As a top priority, ADOV is a collaborative partner with the Department of Education to help school districts throughout Arkansas comply with Act 648 of 1993, which requires all public schools to provide community service programs for students in grades nine (9) through 12.

ADOV also teams with the Arkansas Volunteer Coordinator's Association to produce an annual two-day statewide volunteer training conference with a nationally known presenter. This allows volunteer directors to update their skills and stay in tune with the trends, at minimum cost.

E. Promotion and Recognition of volunteerism and volunteer activities is one of ADOV's primary functions and has been crucial to the development and expansion of volunteer efforts in the state. Our latest publication of the *Economic Impact of Arkansas Volunteers* (FY 94) reports that 324,610 Arkansans volunteered 8,292,529 recorded hours of service for an estimated value of \$122,558,735. Specific recognition programs on which ADOV collaborates and sponsors are:

The Channel 4 Community Service Awards, sponsored cooperatively by KARK TV, the Governor's Office and ADOV, annually recognizes eight individuals, two corporations, one youth and one distinguished citizen. 1997 will be the twentieth year.

Arkansas Volunteer Community of the Year Awards, in cooperation with the Arkansas Municipal League, the Governor's Office, ADOV and the Arkansas Highway and Transportation Department, honors 12 state communities annually. This program began in 1982.

Certificates of Recognition, often signed by the Governor and the Director of ADOV, are sent to thousands of Arkansans for their community service involvement.

ADOV also sponsors National Volunteer Week, Arkansas Volunteer Month, National Youth Service Day, and the Presidents Service Awards. National Youth Service Day in 1996 brought youth together in McArthur Park to celebrate their community service in areas of beautification, work with the elderly, tutoring and numerous other areas.

F. National Service has been led in Arkansas by ADOV since the 1991 development of the Delta Service Corps (DSC), a tri-state consortium which places citizens over age 17 in local programs to provide services to meet human, educational, environmental and public safety needs. As the former grantee, ADOV will be responsible for managing the Educational Awards Program associated with the 1992-1994 grant for some 215 Arkansas Corps members through the year 2001. DSC is officially transferring from ADOV and the Department of Human Services to a 501 (c),3 agency in September of 1996. It will be located in Greenville, Mississippi.

Also housed with, and administratively supported by, ADOV is the Arkansas Commission on National Community Service, which fosters national service in the state by providing information, support, training and technical assistance. The Arkansas Commission also sub-grants federal funds to three AmeriCorps programs in Arkansas. These programs address national priorities in education, public safety, human needs and the environment.

ADOV staff, In partnership with the Department of Education, also provides training for each of the 24 Learn and Serve America K-12 school programs.

The Corporation for National and Community Service Awarded the Delta Service Corps \$3.4 million to start the program and support its first participants. The second year's operating budget was \$5.2 million, \$3.1 million was appropriated for operating cost in year three (3) and 2.1 million in year four (4) under the auspices of AmeriCorps.

Arkansas Commission on National & Community Service: This priority is to request appropriations currently authorized through the MFG Grant applications process to fund the Arkansas State Commission on National and Community Service. This includes two (2) MFG positions (one grade 23, one grade 20) and to reinstate one grade 15 position to provide headquarters functions and direct support for the Commission during 1995-97 biennium. This request includes salaries and personnel service match. Federally funded.

ARKANSAS BUDGET SYSTEM ANALYSIS OF BUDGET REQUEST 1997 - 1999

The Arkansas Office of Volunteerism was created in 1974 by order of the Governor to implement and administer a statewide immunization program. In 1977, the Office was established by Act 865 to assess and recognize the needs of communities throughout Arkansas and recruit, train, and coordinate volunteers and volunteer organizations in meeting those needs, assist in special projects to meet community needs, and provide greater public awareness and recognition of volunteer efforts. In 1983, the Office of Volunteer Services was transferred from the Office of the Governor to the Department of Human Services. Act 186 of 1989 officially made the agency a Division of DHS. The mission of the **Arkansas Division of Volunteerism (ADOV)** is to promote volunteerism as a means of community problem solving. This is accomplished through the various programs and community service activities of ADOV which include:

- ⇒ coordination of the county-based United Community Organizations of Arkansas, a collaboration of county efforts to manage local volunteer programs such as food banks, clothing and emergency shelters, hospice care, and weatherization programs for the elderly;
- ⇒ management of a DHS volunteer clearinghouse that recruits, screens, and refers volunteers to individual divisions of DHS;
- ⇒ establishment and direction of an Arkansas Mentors Program in partnership with the Division of County Operations to assist AFDC clients in becoming self sufficient;
- ⇒ assisting the Department of Education with development and coordination of 16 Youth Action Councils in Arkansas schools created to provide credit for youths participating in community service programs as mandated by Act 648 of 1993;
- ⇒ direction of a Volunteer Consultant Services Program (VCSP) which coordinates efforts of professional volunteers for public projects;
- ⇒ coordination of various recognition and promotional programs to include National Volunteer Week, Arkansas Volunteer Month, National Youth Service Day, annual Community Service Awards, Community of the Year Awards, and the Governor's Volunteer Recognition Program; and
- ⇒ support of the Delta Service Corps, a joint venture between Arkansas, Mississippi and Louisiana implemented in July, 1992 with funding from the National Commission on Community Service. The goal of the Corps is to promote civic responsibility and to develop a structured

method for individuals over age 17 to commit significant amounts of time to meet human, educational, environmental, and public safety needs. Corps participants receive small stipends and educational funds in exchange for services. As of August 1996, the Corps assumed 501 (c)3 status and is based in Greenville, Mississippi. ADOV will continue to directly administer post-service benefits for Corps participants until 2001.

The ADOV also supports efforts of the Arkansas Commission on National and Community Service (ACNCS) which consists of 17 commissioners appointed by the Governor for three year terms. Through the AmeriCorps Program, the ACNCS subgrants federal funds to projects in Arkansas designed to address national priorities in education, public safety, human needs and the environment.

The Division submitted a priority request totaling \$89,429 in FY98 and \$91,684 in FY99. The request is for reauthorization of one existing non-budgeted position and two positions currently authorized by miscellaneous federal grant to enhance efforts of the Arkansas Commission on National and Community Service.

The Biennial Budget also includes a request to increase the maximum annual salary of two (2) non-classified positions above the 2.8% recommended for State Employees. These positions serve as the Deputy Director and the Assistant Deputy Director of the Division. This request is a component of a departmental request that would provide a maximum salary that could be paid to 51 various non-classified personnel based on criteria to be developed by the Department. Payment of the maximum salary would not be automatic and would depend on functions performed, supervisory responsibility, and financial and budgetary accountability as determined by respective Division Directors. Salary and Matching amounts requested total \$33,464 in FY98 and \$34,404 in FY99.

The Executive Recommendation provides for Base Level, which includes appropriation for a 2.8% Cost of Living Allowance for positions on July 1 of each year of the biennium along with accompanying employee matching requirements. Also included in the recommendation is continued authorization of three (3) federally-funded positions that support the Arkansas Commission on National and Community Service. The Executive Recommendation does not reflect the Agency Request for extraordinary increases for non-classified positions at this time.
